

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

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
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Attention pet owners

The No. 1 complaint received in our office is about pets.

As you are out enjoying the summer weather and walking your pet please take advantage of the Pet Waste Stations. There are six waste stations throughout the community, they are located at; each side of the bridge at Westlake Hills and Turtle Bay, Harrison Ridge Park, at the bridge across from the fire station on Terrace Lake Road, at the bridge at Northlake Shores, and on Tipton Lakes Boulevard near Oakbrook. If you see a Pet Waste Station that needs attention, please call the association office at 812-342-8522.

THE FOLLOWING ARE A FEW SEASONAL, PET-FRIENDLY REMINDERS:


SCOOP THE POOP: Please remember to clean up after your pets when exercising them. Pet waste should not be left along walk paths or in common areas, the marina or park areas. Please remove and properly dispose of pet waste.

NOT AT THE BEACH: Pets are not allowed at the beach area at the marina.

LEASH RECOMMENDED: The association recommends keeping pets on a leash, especially on the pedestrian paths.

STOP EXCESSIVE BARKING: As we are all out enjoying nicer weather, excessive barking from pets can dampen enjoyment. Pet owners are encouraged to train their dogs to limit excessive barking. Seek local training opportunities through our city animal control offices.

Your cooperation is much appreciated and will allow all of us to enjoy our park-like setting.



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COMMUNITY ASSOCIATIONS: THREE REALITIES YOU CAN'T ESCAPE

All community associations have three things in common.

MEMBERSHIP IS MANDATORY.

Buying a home in a community association automatically makes you an association member, by law.

GOVERNING DOCUMENTS ARE BINDING.

Association governing documents can be compared to contracts. They specify the owners' obligations (following the rules, paying assessments) and the association's obligations (maintaining common areas, preserving home values).

YOU COULD LOSE YOUR HOME IF YOU FAIL TO PAY ASSESSMENTS.

Associations have a legal right to place a lien on your property if you don't pay assessments.

But take heart! Associations also have three realities they can't escape. Associations have an obligation to provide three broad categories of service to residents.

Community services: For example, these can include maintaining a community website, orienting new owners or organizing social activities.

Governance services: For example, establishing and maintaining design review standards, enforcing rules and recruiting volunteers.

Business services: For example, competitively bidding maintenance work, investing reserve funds responsibly, developing long-range plans and collecting assessments.


By delivering these services fairly and effectively, community associations not only protect and enhance the value of individual homes, but they provide owners an opportunity to participate in decisions affecting their community and quality of life. And those are realities we can live with.

» Security

Tipton Lakes Community Association has hired an outside contractor, Columbus Security, to provide periodic security for the summer months. The security guards will be in uniform but in unmarked vehicles. They will be on the property at random days and times. They will be monitoring the common areas for use by non-Tipton Lakes Members. If you are visiting a common area, you may be asked to provide proof of residency. Our goal is for this not to be an inconvenience but rather a protection of the assessments our members pay for the maintenance and upkeep of the common areas. It's not fair for others to use the common areas that do not pay for such use.

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
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ANNUAL MEETING UPDATE

The association's annual meeting was held on April 18, 2022 virtually. Prior to the meeting the election committee determined that a quorum for the election of board directors was not met. The bylaws of the association state that if a quorum is not met then the current board members continue to serve until such time as they resign from office. Since the quorum was not met, there was no business to come before the meeting.

The cluster committee ballots were counted by the elections committee prior to the meeting. For clusters that did not reach a quorum, the volunteers, were appointed by the board of directors. A complete listing is included in this issue of Tipton Life.

Andy Simms, president of the association opened the meeting, and recognized the board members and introduced Staci Likens, executive director. Mrs. Likens introduced staff Nancy Battin, who has been with the association for 26 years and Malorie Ackerman. Mrs. Likens highlighted the accomplishments during 2021 which included work with the city of Columbus on several drainage issues, the addition of walk path at the tunnels, the review of the security plan, the new memorial policy, and the continuing development in Oak Ridge, Spring Hill, Horizon West and Tipton Pointe. Mrs. Likens discussed the 2022 goals of the association which included continued work with the city of Columbus on drainage repairs, website updates, securing a contractor for the 2023 reserve study, and the Lookout road closure. Mrs. Likens ended her report by giving an update on the remaining development throughout the Tipton Lakes community.

James Vogel, treasurer and finance committee chair of the association presented the audited financial report. He noted that applicable excerpts were mailed to all members and that complete copies are available at the association office. Mr. Vogel shared comparable information regarding revenue, expense, reserve fund and property/equipment over the last two years. Mr. Vogel stated that association revenue is the same in 2021 from 2020. Mr. Vogel also indicated that expenses were down in 2021 from 2020 due to the dredging project in 2020. In addition, he shared that out of 1287 households there were two delinquent assessment accounts at the end of 2021. Mr. Vogel thanked his Finance Committee members and the staff for their assistance over the past year.

Prior to the May 23, 2022 board meeting the following board members resigned from the board, Dan Slattery and James Vogel. The remaining board of directors appointed Andy Simms, a resident of Westlake Hills; Brenden Barker, a resident of Oak Ridge; and Rob Forste, a resident of Horizon West, to three-year terms on the board of directors. The board elected new officers at the May 23, 2022 board meeting. The updated information is available at www.tiptonlakes.com.



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

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MARINA NEWS

As you receive your summer edition of Tipton Life, the marina is open and in full swing for another season of offering a wonderful amenity to our Tipton Lakes members.

The marina officially opened for the season May 7, please reference your marina brochure or www.tiptonlakes.com for operating hours. The association encourages members to make reservations for boat rentals and facilities such as, the Lower Level Gathering Room, in advance at the association office, Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. **ALL BOAT RENTAL RESERVATIONS MUST BE PAID FOR BY USING YOUR DEBIT/CREDIT CARD, NO CASH WILL BE ACCEPTED.** Boat rentals of more than two hours will require payment two days prior to rental. Rental boats are in high demand during the summer months, particularly on the weekends. Therefore, it is encouraged that members make reservations in advance to ensure that we can provide a boat at the time desired.

If you have not rented a boat before, this season is a good time to give boat rentals a try. We have four pontoon boats that hold up to nine people that are available this year. We also have one pontoon boat especially equipped for those who like to fish, that holds six people. In addition to the pontoon boats we have four kayaks. Two of the kayaks are doubles and two are singles. We also have two paddleboards available to rent.

Your driver's license serves as your membership card and is required for all boat rentals. Summer marina passes are required, in lieu of a membership card, for those without a valid driver's license. Summer marina passes can be obtained at the association office only, Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Marina brochures were mailed in mid-March and include detailed information regarding rental rates, lake treatment dates, and contact information for the marina staff. Everything you need to know to enjoy the amenities at Tipton Lakes is included in one convenient brochure. You may also find information on the association's website at www.tiptonlakes.com.

We are proud of our marina area and hope that you will assist your association by:

- » Discouraging non-member use. Please remember to have your driver's license or summer marina pass with you at all times when using amenities.
- » Encouraging a litter-free area.
- » Encouraging a pet-free swim and beach area.
- » Hosting parties at the marina no later than 10 p.m. when the beach area closes.
- » Calling the Columbus Police Department when you observe suspicious activity in the area. The CPD non-emergency number is 812-376-2600.

IMPORTANT REMINDER FOR BOAT OWNERS

As the summer boating season gets underway, the association would like to remind all boat owner members to observe the following rules for boating on Tipton Lakes:



- » Stay 50 feet (about 3 boat lengths) away from homeowner's docks, swimming areas or shoreline areas.
- » The marina bay, all small coves and the canals are considered SLOW ZONES. When traveling in these designated areas, slow the boat so that no wake is produced.
- » If boating late at night, please be respectful to others by keeping the noise level low. Even if you are in the middle of the lake, noise carries a long way across the water. Loud late-night parties on a boat are very disruptive to the tranquility that we all enjoy.
- » After dusk please use your boat lights to help other boaters see you.

HAVEN AT HERON COVE

Heron Cove cluster
thrives on community

Heron Cove is the second westernmost cluster at Tipton Lakes. It's on the eastern shore of a lake between it and Spring Hill. The lake is somewhat smaller than the original Tipton Lakes, but has its distinct charms. The eastern portion tapers to a ravine replete with marshy plant life. Heron Cove residents note the prevalence of various types of birds. Certainly the namesake heron, of mostly the white variety, but occasionally grey as well. They report seeing geese, swans, pelicans, hawks and ducks, and even the occasional bald eagle.

The lake is big enough to accommodate such activities as kayaking, canoeing and fishing.

As Heron Cove residents head west on Goeller Road toward home, they enjoy the panorama of the front range of southern Indiana’s hills. The view to the north is woods.

It’s a fairly recent development among Tipton Lakes neighborhoods. It was originally conceived as having a 55-and-older target demographic, but it soon gained appeal among families with children as well.

John and Mariane Hinds had their home built in 2013 and were about the third household to move to Heron Cove.

The houses are built by M/I Homes, but dwellers have had the option of a number of ways to customize the basic design. John and Mariane went with an open concept. One prominent feature is a sunroom adjacent to the dining room, allowing guests in each space to interact. Their house is also ADA compliant, mainly to accommodate their son, who lives in town and comes to visit frequently.



“I saw this development on the Internet,” says John. “At the time, our house in town was going to need a lot of work soon, so I’d been thinking about options.”

Mariane wasn’t sold on moving to the city’s far west side at first. She was apprehensive about the long drive to places she frequently goes, such as church.

“But when you retire, you can kind of slow life down,” she says. “Now I feel blessed to live out here.”

She appreciates the fact that families with kids have established a presence.

“There are some kids that stop by to visit us. We’ve really become close with a family across the street. We attend their activities such as dance recitals, birthdays and Indian festivals.”

John likes the international quality of the neighborhood. He notes that there are Indian, Brazilian, Chinese and Mexican households.



She had been traveling a lot for her job as a veterinarian working for a drug company, but recently switched to a position that allows her more time at home. Her family, originally from West Lafayette, came bit by bit to Tipton Lakes. Her parents live in Westlake Park and her brother and his family live in Oakbrook.

“Because I was traveling a lot when I moved here, I wanted my house to be like of a vacation home,” she says.

Hence the emphasis on the deck facing the lake and view of the hills, as



well as a fire pit down by the beach. She's an avid landscaper. One prominent creation is her flower garden.

She likes her neighbors a lot.

"I had a Heron Cove party at my house last fall to welcome new arrivals. I've known more neighbors here than any place I've ever lived."

She's also hosted fish fries, and a barbecue with extended family for her parents' 50th anniversary.

She was immediately convinced that Heron Cove was the place for her.

"I drove by one day and saw that the lot was open," she says. "I wrote a check that day."

Robin Hilber moved to the neighborhood in

the spring of 2021.

"My kids were shocked," she notes. "I'd lived at The Lagoons in town and experienced the 2008 flood. I'd sworn I was never going to live on a body of water again."

It's home now, though. Heading out on the walking paths is one of her favorite activities. She also enjoys the variety of birds on the lake.

Heron Cove distills the various appeals of Tipton Lakes in general. There is definitely a feel of being in a pastoral setting, but convenient ways to get into the city abound. Most important of all to its residents, though, is being surrounded by people who are a delight to live with.



KEEPING TIPTON GROUNDED

Local contractor contributes more than mulch

Sam Vasquez is indispensable to Tipton Lakes, not only for the work he does as a contractor, but for what he adds to its culture. A burly, white-haired man with a long, flowing beard and hands that are well-acquainted with physical labor, he's easily given to a hearty laugh and is a storehouse of Tipton Lakes lore.

For the association, he handles minor landscaping projects, fence repair, tree planting and removal, building repair,

construction of retaining walls and shrub replacement. He also has a roster of homeowner clients.

His crew varies in size from two to eight people. They work out of a building located on Carr Hill Road owned by the association. He starts his day by stopping at the association office to get a list of work orders from executive director Staci Likens.

He works for nine months a year, and

then, according to him, hibernates for three.

Actually, he spends that time woodworking, building tables, wall hangings, shelves and hope chests.

He moved with his family to Brown County from Mercedes, Texas at age 2 in 1960. His father had a 200-acre Christmas tree farm on Beck's Grove Road, on land where Sam still lives. He sold trees on a wholesale basis all over Indiana and Kentucky.

When Sam took the operation over, he expanded into landscaping. He does still raise what he terms "a few" trees, meaning around 800.

He's worked for Tipton Lakes since 1998.

"Bill Champion Jr. asked me to help him lay sod at the marina and association office site," says Vasquez. "Don Michael told him, 'I like the way they work. When they get done with this job, give them another one, and then another one.' That's how it started."

He originally worked out of a barn where Spring Hill is now. When the association relocated the contracting facility, he bought the barn and moved it to his Brown County land.

He's seen lots of changes and growth.

"I used to bail hay out of the land where a lot of these additions are," he says. "Pintail had just started when I did. I'd say Waterside was half-developed then."

He and his wife Barbara have two daughters, Andi and Sarah. They each used to work for the association, watering flowers and landscaping, respectively.

He's cultivated a lot of friendships, some going back to his beginnings with Tipton Lakes.

"A lot of people know me here."

The white hair and beard result from chemotherapy he underwent for kidney cancer in 2005.

"One day, some years back, our crew was planting trees down the road," he recalls. "I was all bundled up. A lady and her kids went by on the trail. One kid stopped and said, 'Look, there's Santa planting a tree!'"

At the time of his kidney issue, his team of doctors also detected spots on his lung. He was put on a medicine that had been newly developed. At present, he has one spot left, which has neither grown nor presented him with problems.

"I still take my chemo pill every day," he says. "But


actually, it's all up to him," he adds, pointing a finger upward. "If I'm here tomorrow that's great. If not, I'm in a better place."

He has no plans to taper off.

"It's not really work," he says. "Well, in a way it is, but it's quite a feeling to look at a site at the end of a day and see how different it looks from when you arrived in the morning and say, 'I did that.'"

TIDBITS

- ▶ **Trash Toters should be stored out of sight**, such as in a garage or screened from view when not in use. Please do not leave your toter out where it can be easily seen from the street view of your home. The association regularly inspects the property for toter violations. Members will receive a violation notice if the toter is not stored properly.
- ▶ **Call Before Digging.** Finding out if it's "safe to dig" on your property is as easy as dialing 811 to arrange for utility companies to mark locations of underground lines.
- ▶ **Lake Treatment Schedule.** Remember to watch for red buoys in the lakes. These indicate a 24-hour prohibition on swimming, eating fish and general contact with the water.
 - June 8 & 22 • Aug. 10 & 24
 - July 6 & 20 • Sept. 14

The above dates are subject to change with possible inclement weather conditions. If you are planning an event, you may want to check with the association office, 812-342-8522, to see if the lake treatment schedule has changed due to inclement weather.
- ▶ **Round up those weeds!** A little bit of weed killer on your sidewalks and curbs works wonders to beautify your yard.
- ▶ **One way to be a good neighbor in the spring and summer:** avoid early morning hours or times when a neighbor is hosting an outdoor event when mowing your lawn!
- ▶ **One way to be a good association member in the summer:** Do not blow grass clippings into the lake. They just end up in the bottom of the lake, costing more to maintain our clean lake system.
- ▶ **Help us maintain our pedestrian paths.** Although we perform a yearly audit on the conditions of our paths, there are miles of them to keep track of. If you notice a problem area, please call the association office. In addition, the association maintains the grass between the path and the curb. However, homeowners maintain the area inside the path. If there is a problem with overgrown landscaping that impedes passage on the paths, please let the association office know and staff will contact the owner. Assistance from owners in maintaining plants along the path is greatly appreciated.
- ▶ **City Chuckhole Patrol has swung into action** and is readily patching those annoying holes that have popped up everywhere in the streets over the winter months. City residents wishing to report chuckholes may call the City Garage at 812-376-2508, Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.



STREETLIGHT NOT WORKING?

The association staff monitors street lights on a regular basis and reports those that are not working. However, we may not notice a light that is near your home, mailbox, along your regular walking route, etc. If you notice a light not working please send an email to malorie.ackerman@tiptonlakes.com or call the office at 812-342-8522. When reporting a light out please provide the number off of the light pole, this aids in having them repaired.

Thinking about retiring?

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
